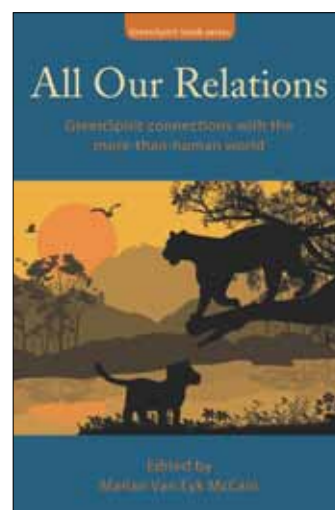


ABOUT THE CONTRIBUTORS
